

## Our Curriculum

This term, all of our classes have been busy learning about a range of topics, as well as developing new skills across the curriculum. These pages provide a summary of the exciting activities which the children have taken part in. In addition to the information below, the children have also enjoyed a House Learning Day about cultures from around the world, Harvest assembly, Nativity plays, a Christingle service and a whole school trip to the Pantomime. The children's home learning projects have been an amazing addition to their work across the curriculum and we have been impressed with their effort and hard work towards these. ### Science

Across the school, the children have been working scientifically to develop their science knowledge and understanding. Reception looked closely as part of a class experiment into salt dough gingerbread men. On an Autumn walk, Year 1 photographed some of the seasonal changes they saw. Year 5 enjoyed observing the super moon as part of their topic on Space and Year 3 investigated the relationship between light, objects and shadows. All of the children have been applying their English skills through creative writing opportunities. Year 4 wrote a recount after a dental hygienist visit, and Year 2 wrote about Charles Mackintosh and the development of a new material. *Miss Taylor*

### Computing

We have benefited this term from the purchase of 20 new school laptops. These have been put to good use throughout the school in developing a range of computing skills. Reception have been learning to control a mouse on screen. Year 1 have learnt the 'basics' of logging on and off, Year 2 have developed their understanding of email and Year 3 have been learning about the importance of debugging. Both Year 5 and 6 have linked their work to topics, looking at coding and the work of Ada Lovelace respectively. On a weekly basis, all classes discuss how to stay safe online, both at school and at home. Our parent workshops have supported us with this. *Mr Yeldham*

### Design and Technology

In D and T, children have had the opportunity to make a variety of different models such as moving toys in Year 5, and Flanimal characters in Year 6, applying their digital design skills. Years 2 and 3 have been busy designing and sewing money pouches and Christmas tree decorations. Reception and Year 1 have designed and made their own models whilst Year 3 were able to practice their skills at weaving. Children have also been very busy practising their baking and cooking skills. Tasty apple pies and gingerbread men were baked in Reception, Year 1 and 2. Year 3 made a delicious soup and Year 4 baked scones. Tying in with their history topic, Year 5 made Victorian Tea biscuits from an old fashioned recipe and Year 6 made jams, chutneys and crumbles.

### English
