Spotlight on Attendance

On 8th January 2024, the Government launched a national campaign to remind parents and carers of the importance of school attendance.

Improving school attendance is everyone's business and, to tackle the challenge, schools and families need to work together.

The link between attendance and attainment is clear:

• In 2018/19, just 40% of persistently absent (PA) children in KS2 achieved expected KS2 standards, compared with 84% of pupils who were regular attenders.

But attendance is important for more than just attainment:

• Regular school attendance can facilitate positive peer relationships, which is a protective factor for mental health and wellbeing. Per the Chief Medical Officer, "it is usually appropriate for parents and carers to send their children to school with mild respiratory illnesses. This would include general cold symptoms: a minor cough, runny nose or sore throat. However, children should not be sent to school if they have a temperature of 38°C or above."

What can you do?

At Manland, we have clear expectations for parents and carers about what they need to do to support good attendance. Parents/carers are responsible for:

- > ensuring that their children are punctual and know the importance of good attendance.
- instilling in their children an appreciation of the importance of attending school regularly.
- informing the school on any day of absence, **by 9.10 am** at the latest.
- > providing the school with an explanation for the absence.
- working in partnership with the school to resolve issues and help the school to understand their child's barriers to attendance.
- booking any medical appointments before or after the school day, wherever possible.
- > only requesting leave of absence in exceptional circumstances and doing so in advance.
- In the case of illness, referring to the NHS guidance "<u>Is my child too ill for school guidance</u>" and the Chief Medical Officer Chris Whitty's letter on mild illness and school attendance.

Prolonged or regular periods of absence are likely to heighten a child's anxiety about attending school in the future.

What are we doing?

- Where your child's attendance is low, we will contact you to offer support to help raise your child's attendance
- We work hard to reduce the spread of infection in our school pupils are regularly reminded of the importance of regular and effective handwashing. Spaces are well-ventilated and the school uses CO2 monitors to manage good ventilation.

Spotlight on British Values

Pupil Parliament

At the end of last term, we were once again been busy promoting British Values through our election of the new Pupil Parliament.



Pupil Parliament will replace School Council and will continue to enable pupils from all year groups to be actively involved in many ways across the school. This year, children will become a 'Minister' with special responsibilities for certain areas of the school.

Just like School Council, children were elected by their class after giving a short speech in which they outlined their leadership skills and explained why they were standing for election. Each year group elected two Members of Parliament to take on a 'ministerial role,' apart from Year 6, who elected four, two of whom were appointed as Prime Minister and Deputy Prime minister.

Spotlight on Safeguarding

Safeguarding is our number 1 priority at Manland Primary. Every child has the right to be safe from harm and danger. It is everyone's responsibility to ensure every child is free from worry and able to learn and develop in a safe and secure environment.

Lanyard System

We wanted to remind parents and carers of the lanyard system which we have at Manland. This is an important part of our safeguarding procedures and is enforced at all times.

All visitors to our site must sign in at the office and obtain a lanyard. No person can be in the school building without a lanyard under any circumstances, no matter how short a period. The type of lanyard you receive will depend on the safeguarding checks in place for you.

- Governor Lanyard
- All Governor recruitment checks in place, including enhanced DBS
- Can be unsupervised whilst on site

Green



- Volunteer Lanyard
- All volunteer checks in place, including enhanced DBS
- Can be unsupervised whilst on site

Blue



- Visitor Lanyard
- Must be accompanied by a member of staff at all times whilst on site

Safeguarding Team

At Manland we have a Safeguarding Team who work with our pupils, families and outside agencies. They also support all of the staff in ensuring we provide the best care for our pupils.

The Designated Safeguarding Lead at Manland is Mrs Wicks. There are two deputy Designated Safeguarding Leads – Mr Comer and Mrs Kemp. Mrs Wicks and Mr Comer are also trained in Safer Recruitment.

Our Safeguarding Governor is Mr Wardle who monitors that the school meets all statutory requirements in regard to Safeguarding. Our deputy Safeguarding Governor is Mrs Montgomery.

All of the adults in our school help to keep children safe.

Crossing Patrol – Ox Lane

We know there is still concern about the lack of a crossing patrol on Ox Lane at school drop off and pick up. This is a service provided by Herts County Council, and despite, regular advertising, we understand that they have not been able to recruit someone for this role.

It was recently suggested at Parent Forum that parents/carers may wish to make contact with the Council to suggest that, if it is not possible to recruit a new crossing patrol person, that perhaps they could consider a permanent solution e.g. traffic lights, to enable children to cross safely.

Homework grids

Following the last parent forum meeting, we wanted to get in contact with parents and carers regarding our approach to homework grids and marking expectations.

At Manland, pupils are encouraged to continue their learning at home. They do this in a wide variety of ways.

Every day, pupils in Reception and Year 1 take home a phonics book from our Little Wandle Scheme. They are also encouraged to read a sharing book and a library book with their adults at home.

From Year 1 onwards, homework is set weekly and consists of:

- · Daily Reading
- Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling Core Skills Workbook
- Weekly Spelling patterns with wordlists
- Maths Core Skills Workbook
- Homework grid with suggested activities for each area of the curriculum

Our pupils are encouraged to choose a topic homework task and present this in a way which is personal to them. We are often blown away with the children's creativity and inspirational approach to this!

We appreciate that not all families have the time, resources and/or knowledge to undertake work at home with their children. As this work is optional, no formal marking is undertaken, however children may receive verbal feedback from their teacher and/or a reward from our school reward system.
