Spotlight on academic success



Attendance

Following on from previous communications regarding the importance of attendance, we are still seeing a number of term time holidays at our school:

• On 20th October 2023, 13 pupils were absent due to term time holidays.

For this reason, we have made the decision to start introducing Penalty Notices from January 2024 onwards. This is not a decision we have taken lightly; when making this decision we have taken into account all those impacted by term time holidays.

Full details can be found in our attendance policy on the school website (Key Information / Statutory Information).

Parents/Carers at risk of a penalty notice will be sent a warning letter first; an example is attached to the newsletter. In the event of further term time holidays, the school **may** ask the Local Authority to issue a Penalty Notice.

We sincerely hope that the introduction of Penalty Notices from January 2024 will reduce term time holidays and the impact they have. We thank parents and carers for following our attendance policy.







Safeguarding: Fireworks Night

If you are planning to celebrate Fireworks Night this year, we hope you have a wonderful time. Please remind your children of the following safety messages to stay safe:

- Fireworks are exciting, but they can be very dangerous and can hurt you. Listen to your grown-up about where is a safe place to stand.
- Never touch a firework. Don't pick up a firework after it has been used.
- Wear your gloves when you hold your sparkler and keep it away from your body.
- · Hold one sparkler at a time.
- Keep your sparkly sparkler safely away from other people and don't run around with it.
- Don't throw your sparkler in case it hits someone.
- Once your sparkler is finished, put it into a bucket of water, don't pick it back up. It stays hot for a long time and can burn you.
- Stand well away from the bonfire and stay close to the grown-ups.
- Don't be tempted to throw things into the bonfire or poke at it with sticks.
- Practice your STOP, DROP and ROLL before your fireworks celebrations





Keeping Manland Tidy

Your children will probably recognise these two Manland characters - Tidy Ted and Prim Pup (one for KS2 and one for Reception and KS1)! They help us keep our corridors and cloakrooms neat and tidy.



This means hanging up our PE kits and coats, trainers stored neatly underneath, keeping our corridors free from clutter and putting things back where they belong! The class which has the tidiest cloakroom gets to keep Tidy Ted or Prim Pup in their classroom for a week!









It's Good To ' Talk '



Online Safety: How to start a conversation with your child about using a phone safely:

Why do you want to get a phone?

Whilst deciding if it is time for your child to have their first phone can be a great opportunity to find out what your child expects to use their phone for. This could be for connecting with friends, playing games, for keeping in touch whilst out of the house or other reasons.



What do you like about using your phone?

You can ask your child about their favourite apps or games, what they like using their phone for, or you can ask them to show you how to play or use their favourite game or website.

What would you do if something worrying or upsetting happened on your phone?

You can ask them about the places they can go to find the safety advice, find out what they know about privacy settings, and ask them how to report or block on the services they use.

How can we do more online together?

Ask your child about activities or games that you could enjoy as a family, this can be a great time to establish a family agreement to manage your families time online.



Talk with your child about responsible use of their phone

Discuss what is okay and not okay to use their phone for. Talk about time limits and expectations of where the device can and cannot be used, this could include things like the phone being charged outside their bedroom overnight.



Discuss what to do if something upsetting or worrying happens

Give them the strategies they need in case something concerning happens whilst they are using their device. This could be to lock the screen and tell an adult, to make a report to the platform they are using, or to block the user.



Explore parental controls

Take a look at the controls available both on the phone itself and on your home Wi-Fi. Talk these through with your child too. Parental controls are a helpful tool, but an open conversation with your child is the most important thing.







Message from Herts Fire and Rescue Service

Hertfordshire Fire and Rescue Service are asking students to take part in providing their input into the Community Risk Management Plan (CRMP). Your voice can shape the future of the fire service in Hertfordshire by completing a short survey.

(Parents/Guardians/Carers – please support your child with giving their views or complete it on their behalf).

Developing and maintaining our Community Risk Management Plan enables Hertfordshire Fire and Rescue Service (HFRS) to assess all foreseeable fire-and-rescue-related risks, while ensuring we are meeting our legal requirements. The objective of the CRMP is to ensure the allocation of our resources are utilised in the most efficient manner to mitigate risk and improve community safety. By participating in this survey, you will support Hertfordshire Fire and Rescue Service to understand how prepared people who live and work in Hertfordshire are to dealing with emergencies, building a picture of the barriers there are to people joining the fire and rescue service, and learn how it can better engage with the local community.

As future firefighters or users of Hertfordshire Fire and Rescue Service, you play an important part in this decision-making process.
