We also welcomed our new Reception class on Wednesday this week and it has been fantastic to see them so quickly become part of our community. We can't wait to see what they will go on to achieve.

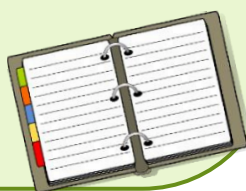
The Autumn term is always jam packed so I just wanted to remind you to keep an eye on our school website for diary dates and updates:

Our whole school attendance for this week is **98.3%**, with both Year 5 and 6 achieving 100%. This is a fantastic start – keep it up everyone!

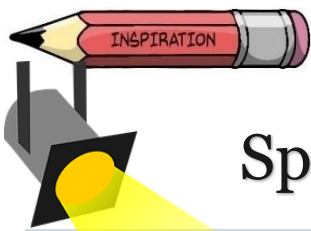

Spotlight on Attendance

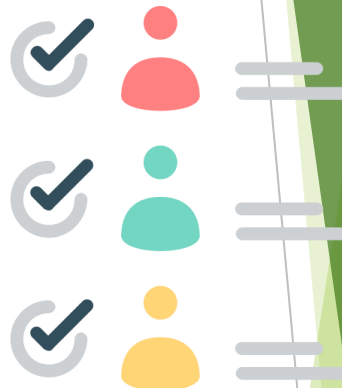
All **parents want** the best for their children and for them to get on well in life. Having a good **education is important** to ensure that they have the best opportunities in their adult life. They only get **one chance** at school, and your child's future may be affected by not attending school regularly.

If children do not attend school regularly they may:

- Struggle to keep up with school work. In a busy school day it is difficult for schools to find the extra time to help a child catch up.
- Miss out on the social side of school life. Poor attendance can affect children's ability to make and keep friendships; a vital part of growing up.
- Setting good attendance patterns from an early age, from nursery through primary school will also help your child later on in their life.

What can you do to help?

- If you suspect that your child may be missing school or is unhappy at school you should contact the school as soon as possible so that you can work with them to resolve any difficulties.
- Be on alert for any particular reasons for non-attendance, such as bullying or problems with school work and discuss these with the school.
- If your child is ill or absent for any other reasons, contact the school office, on each day of absence, by 9.30am.
- Follow the schools' procedures for notifying absence, and always let the school know of any days that your child is unable to attend.
- Make sure your child arrives at school on time.



At Manland, we expect children to achieve attendance of 96%. Please see our website for more information about attendance

Attending school every day = 100% attendance

Attending 4½ days a week = 90% attendance = **4 weeks missed per year**

Attending 4 days a week = 80% attendance = more than **half a term missed per year.**

Attending 3½ days each week = 70% attendance = more **than a quarter of the school year missed.**

An average attendance of 80% or less across a child's school career adds up to missing a **whole 2 years from school.**

Being late for school reduces learning time:

If your child is 5 minutes late every day, they will miss **3 days of learning** each year.

If your child is 15 minutes late every day, they will miss **2 weeks of learning** each year.

Safeguarding Update

Following the introduction of **Keeping Children Safe in Education 2023 on 1st September 2023**, the school has revised its **online safety policy** and **child protection policy**. A copy of these policies can be found on the school website:

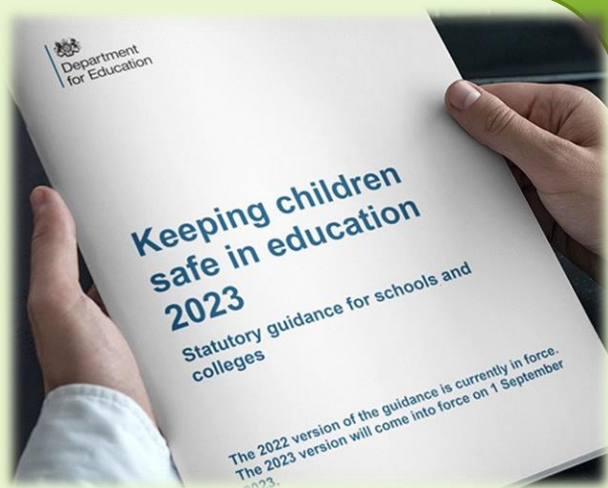

Online Safety Acceptable use agreements will be coming home to all pupils shortly. These will need to be signed by pupils and returned to the school office as early as possible.



Parents and carers also have online safety responsibilities and these are outlined below. We should be grateful if all parents/carers could remind themselves of their responsibilities:

Online Safety Appendix F: Summary of key parent/carers responsibilities

The school provides online safety information for parents/carers, through the website, in newsletters and at events. It is important that parents/carers understand their key role in supporting children to behave appropriately and keep themselves safe online.

The online safety policy, supported by its acceptable use agreements, is intended to protect the interests and safety of the whole school community.

- Parents/carers are required to support their child in understanding and signing the Online Safety Acceptable Use Agreement for pupils.
- Parents/carers may only use personal mobile phones and devices in designated areas of the school unless otherwise informed, e.g. for specific events and activities. Under no circumstance should images be taken at any time on school premises that include anyone other than their own child, unless there is a pre-specified agreement with individuals and parents/carers. When a parent/carers is on school premises but not in a designated area, their phone/s must be switched off and out of sight.
- Parents/carers should not assume that pupils can bring technological devices to school and should always check the school policy.
- All cyberbullying incidents affecting children in the school should be reported immediately. (If the incident involves an indecent image of a child the report must also be made immediately to the police for your own protection.) The school will investigate and respond to all reported cyberbullying incidents, liaising with others where appropriate. No reply should ever be sent to the sender/poster of cyberbullying content. If applicable block the sender and report abuse to the site. Evidence should be retained and shown in school and/or to the police. Evidence should not be forwarded.
- The school may choose to set up social media sites, blogs or have some other online presence in its own name. Parents/carers, however, do not have the right to set up any site, page, chat group or any other online presence that uses the school name or logo in any form.
- Any parent/carers, distressed or concerned about an aspect of school should make immediate contact with a member of staff rather than posting their concerns online. Parents/carers should not share school related information or images online or post material that may bring the school or any individual within it into disrepute. Negative postings about the school would impact on the reputation of the whole school community. Parents/carers are encouraged to report breaches so that we can protect the reputation of the school, staff, pupils and parents/carers.

Spotlight on Financial Support

At the start of the academic year, we wanted to remind families that financial assistance is always available for families who are experiencing hardship – no matter how temporary the period of hardship may be.

Support from Herts County Council

Any parent or carer can make an application for financial support from HCC by visiting www.hertfordshire.gov.uk/freeschoolmeals. We encourage all parents and carers who are experiencing financial difficulties to apply, even if you suspect these difficulties will only be temporary (e.g. a parent/carers has been made redundant and is between jobs). Alternatively, the school office can make an application for you – please just contact us on admin@manland.herts.sch.uk.
