Well done Year 5 for showing great responsibility on the roads!










Spotlight on History

Safeguarding

Lanyard System

Safeguarding is our number 1 priority at Manland Primary. Every child has the right to be safe from harm and danger. It is everyone's responsibility to ensure every child is free from worry and able to learn and develop in a safe and secure environment.

We wanted to remind parents and carers of the lanyard system which we have at Manland. This is an important part of our safeguarding procedures and is enforced at all times.

All visitors to our site must sign in at the office and obtain a lanyard. No person can be in the school building without a lanyard under any circumstances, no matter how short a **period.** The type of lanyard you receive will depend on the safeguarding checks in place for you.

- Staff Lanyard
- All staff recruitment checks in place, including enhanced **DBS**
- Can be unsupervised whilst on site





- Governor Lanyard
- All Governor recruitment checks in place, including enhanced DBS
- Can be unsupervised whilst on site

Green



- Volunteer Lanyard
- All volunteer checks in place, including enhanced DBS
- Can be unsupervised whilst on site



- Blue
- Visitor Lanyard
- Must be accompanied by a member of staff at all times whilst on site

Is my child too ill for school?

It can be tricky deciding whether or not to keep your child off school when they're unwell. If you do keep your child at home, **it's important to phone Manland School on the first day and every day your child is sick, before 9.15am**. Let us know that your child won't be in and give us the reason.

If your child is well enough to go to school but has an infection that could be passed on, such as a cold sore or head lice, let the office know. The school office is able to administer medication throughout the school day – just come to the office and fill out a medication form.

Vomiting and diarrhoea

Children should stay away from school until they have not been sick or had diarrhoea for at least 2 days (48 hours).

High temperature - Keep them off school until it goes away.

Coughs and colds - It's fine to send your child to school with slight cough or common cold symptoms.

Chickenpox - Keep them off school until all the spots have crusted over. This is usually about 5 days after the spots first appeared.

Cold sores - There's no need to keep your child off school if they have a cold sore.

Conjunctivitis - You don't need to keep your child away from school.

Ear infection - If your child a high temperature or severe earache, keep them off school until they're feeling better.

Hand, foot and mouth disease - If your child seems well enough to go to school, there's no need to keep them off.

Head lice and nits - There's no need to keep your child off school if they have head lice.

Impetigo - They'll need treatment from a pharmacist or GP, often with antibiotics. Keep them off school until all the sores have crusted over and healed, or for 48 hours after they start antibiotic treatment.

Measles - Your child will need to see a GP. Keep your child off school for at least 4 days from when the rash first appears.

Ringworm - It's fine for your child to go to school once they have started treatment.

Scarlet fever - Your child will need treatment with antibiotics from a GP. Otherwise they'll be infectious for 2 to 3 weeks. Your child can go back to school 24 hours after starting antibiotics.

Slapped cheek syndrome (fifth disease) - You don't need to keep your child off school but let the school know.


Threadworms - You don't need to keep your child off school.

COVID-19 - If your child has mild symptoms, such as a runny nose, sore throat, or slight cough, and feels well enough, they can go to school.

- •Only visit houses where there are signs that trick or treaters are welcome, such as Halloween decorations and pumpkins outside.
- •Keep your Halloween 'tricks' safe damage to property or hurting someone is a crime. Threatening and abusive behaviour can amount to an offence too.
- •Remember road safety rules, particularly after dark.
- •Wear something bright so that drivers can see you.
- •If you are planning on hosting your own firework party make sure you tell all your neighbours, especially those with pets which may be affected by the noise.
